Sun Prairie High School Bands

Music has been prominent in the community since 1876 when the Sun Prairie Brass Band Association was first formed by Dr. Charles Crosse. The SPBBA supported the Sun Prairie Cornet Band which played at many community events and holiday functions throughout its' existence. In 1907 music first became a part of the Sun Prairie public school curriculum and the first public school band was created in 1925.



Today there are over 800 students enrolled in Sun Prairie public school bands. Students in the Sun Prairie High School Band program participate in Concert Red, Concert White, Symphonic Band or Wind Ensemble, which meet every day for credit. Student may opt to participate in any portion of our extra-curricular program which includes 3 Jazz Ensembles, two Jazz Combos, pep band, full orchestra, pit orchestra, chamber groups or our summer competitive marching band, the *Sound of Sun Prairie*.



All students in the Sun Prairie Band program receive a weekly lesson from a district band staff member. In addition, a number of students receive additional, instrument specific, private instruction from one of a number of talented musicians from our area. This year, SPHS band members qualified over 50 entries for the Wisconsin State Solo/Ensemble festival to be held in April.

The concert program also sponsors a fall clinic for all of the concert ensembles. All band students also participate in a composer in Residence program that features a guest composer working with all of the concert bands. Past composers include: Charles Rochester Young, Jim Bonney, Sam Hazo, and Richard Saucedo.

The Wind Ensemble has been invited to perform at both the Wisconsin WMEA and WNBA convention, and regional MENC conventions in Minneapolis and Cincinnati. The Wind Ensemble has also earned top honors at the Dixie Classic National Adjudicators Festival in St. Louis, at the Branson Jubilee National Concert Band Festival in Branson, Missouri and Carnegie Hall. The Jazz Ensemble I has performed at the Midwest International Band and Orchestra Clinic with Wynton Marsalis and the WMEA convention with Clark Terry. The jazz ensemble has been a 14 time national finalist in the "Essentially Ellington" festival, placing 3rd twice. The Sound of Sun Prairie has won its' circuit Championship honors in 14 of the last 20 years in the Mid America Competing Band Directors Association summer circuit.



Why Take Band?



Students of the arts continue to outperform their non-arts peers on the SAT, according to reports by the College Entrance Examination Board. SAT takers with coursework/experience in music performance scored 57 points higher on the verbal portion of the test and 43 points higher on the math portion than students with no coursework or experience in the arts.

Cardinal Heights Upper Middle School Bands

In the fall of 2010 a new 10-12 grade Sun Prairie High School and 8-9 grade Cardinal Heights Upper Middle School opened. When the new high school opened the former high school building was renovated and repurposed for use as a new upper middle school for students in grades 8 and 9. The music program at Cardinal Heights includes three concert bands, two orchestras, three choirs, and a digital music class. Concert Bands at Cardinal Heights include an eighth grade band, a ninth grade band, and an eighth and ninth grade auditioned Wind Symphony. Concert bands rehearse daily and students receive weekly small group instruction as part of the band curriculum. Many students elect to participate in several portions of the Cardinal Heights band co-curricular program. These include two jazz ensembles, a jazz combo, the "Epoch Sound" pep band, and a voluntary summer marching band, the "Sound of Sun Prairie".



In the first year of existence, the Cardinal Heights Wind Symphony was selected to perform at the National Band Association—Wisconsin Chapter Annual Convention in Wisconsin Rapids in January of 2011 and the Wisconsin Music Educators Conference in October of 2012. The band was the only middle school ensemble represented at the convention.

Band students at Cardinal Heights have opportunities to participate in the Sun Prairie Middle School Honors Band as well as other state and local honors bands. Each year the 8th Grade Bands participate in the Annual Beyond The Notes Music Festival in Wisconsin Dells. The 9th Grade Band and Wind Symphony travel to Eau Claire or Stevens Point each year to work with clinicians and perform at other schools.



The Sun Prairie Band Program

The Sun Prairie band program offers a comprehensive approach in which students may choose from an abundant array of musical experiences. Each level of the band program adds another dimension to the student's total experience.

Patrick Marsh and Prairie View Middle School Bands

Two identical middle schools opened in 1997 – Patrick Marsh Middle and Prairie View Middle. Both middle schools currently have an enrollment of around 660 students grades 6-7 at each building. Patrick Marsh is located 6 miles North of Madison on Highway 151 and Prairie View is located on Highway 19 on the west side of Sun Prairie.

Currently Patrick Marsh and Prairie View have nearly 230 students participating in band at each school. All beginning band students start in the 6th grade and have full band every other day and one weekly lesson. The 7th grade band students have band every day plus a weekly lesson.

Both middle schools offer two or three jazz ensembles for students in grades 6-7 to participate in. The middle schools in Sun Prairie combine for a middle school jazz festival that takes place each February. Past soloist/clinicians for the middle school festival have included Matt Buchman, Jim Huwe, Lennie Foy, Doug Stone, Ron Carter, Phil Ostrander and Josh Paris. The middle schools in Sun Prairie also host a citywide honor band every November. Conductors have included Patty Schlafer, Matt Gregg, Marti Fults, Tim Gleason, Steve Bina, Lizabeth Rosenthal, Melody Snyder and John Rash.

Both middle school band programs have received numerous individual and group honors. As a group, the bands have performed at the 2006 UW-Milwaukee Concert Band Festival, Milwaukee Art Museum, Wisconsin State Capitol Rotunda, the "New Wisconsin Promise Conference", and the 2006 Wisconsin State Music Conference. The bands have worked with clinicians such as Erik Morales, Brian Balmages, Richard Saucedo, Dr. Charles Young, Lennie Foy, Dr. Glenn Hayes, Dr. John Climer, Dennis Glocke, Michael Sweeney and Samuel R. Hazo. The individual student achievements include the WSMA Middle Level Honors Orchestra and Band, WI-NBA All-State Band, Tri-State Honors Band, UW-Milwaukee Honors Band, and WSMA State District and State Solo/Ensemble Performances.



STEP 1 Mouthpiece Sampling March 9, 10, 11 (during school)

Mouthpiece Sampling is the process of trying different instrument mouthpieces. Students will try five mouthpieces including the flute head joint, clarinet, trumpet, trombone/euphonium, and tuba mouthpieces. A music educator will lead students through this process helping to narrow down what two instruments will work best for them.

In March we will be visiting all the elementary schools to do mouthpiece sampling with students during the school day. Don't worry if you're child is not there when we are, we can also do mouthpiece samplings by appointment. Just contact your future 6th grade band director.

STEP 2 Register For Instrument Fitting

Instrument Fitting is the process of trying the two best instruments recommended for your child. A final decision will be made at this appointment. Instrument fitting times will be scheduled for April 27 (3-8 PM) or April 29 (3-8 PM) at Patrick Marsh Middle School.

After March 9th you can sign up for an instrument fitting time by visiting <http://www.spbb.org/join-band.html>. You can also call one of the band directors to set up a time. Even students auditioning for percussion will need an appointment to either finish the process of signing up, or to pick another instrument if not selected for percussion.

Percussion Audition & Preparation Workshops



The percussionist is a special and unique member of the band. They are the musicians called upon to play parts ranging from melody, to a cymbal crash, to a timpani roll and a variety of other sounds. Through the percussionist's seven years of band they will have learned and experienced playing thirty to forty different instruments. The percussion student therefore, must learn to read both treble and bass clef. They must have a good sense of rhythm and it is a great advantage to have piano skills.

Because the percussion section is so different from other sections, there will be auditions held to determine who will be playing percussion next year. We need to maintain a balanced instrumentation; therefore we need to limit the number of percussionists in the band. Previous experience with percussion instruments does not guarantee that you will be selected for percussion through this audition process. For these reasons, be sure that you have a second choice ready if you are not selected for percussion.

In order to help students prepare for the audition, we will have two percussion workshops for students to learn and practice the audition material. These workshops are not required, but recommended.

Why does the quality of the instrument matter?

Remember that a good quality used instrument is a better buy than a poorly made new instrument. If the instrument is constantly in and out of the repair shop, your "bargain" quickly evaporates. In addition, reputable music retailers will often have rental programs designed to allow ample time to test the student's level of commitment before the parent has to make a purchase decision. Not all instrument manufacturers and retailers provide a warranty on your purchase that will ensure reparability and low maintenance costs. Many instruments of very low quality are on the market now and are closer in quality to toys than to musical instruments. These "instrument shaped objects" will not play in tune or hold adjustment and often can not be repaired due to the low quality materials used in their construction.

What if I purchased or have an instrument already am I'm not sure about the quality? If it is a new purchase keep the receipt. Have a band teacher or instrument repair technician inspect and play the instrument. If possible, talk to a band teacher before purchasing an instrument.

What about an instrument from Ebay or Craig's List? Be very careful purchasing an instrument off of the internet. It is difficult to impossible to tell the quality of the instrument by just a picture. We recommend having a music teacher or repair technician play and inspect any instrument before you buy it. Simply stated, if you find something contact us so we can help!

Tips For Renting: The Importance of a Quality Instrument

Unfortunately, school music programs are not strangers to adversity. Cuts in funding, reductions in staffing, and conflicts in scheduling have often presented challenges to supportive parents and dedicated music teachers. Ironically, the most recent assault may be coming from some of the equipment in the instrumental room. Big box stores have recently sent a flood of poor quality flutes, clarinets, trumpets, and saxophones to many local schools.

Repair technicians, music teachers, and other music professionals who have had the opportunity to examine these instruments agree: they are difficult to play (if they play at all), impossible to play in tune, and often unrepairable due to substandard materials and nonexistent replacement parts. The pot metal, soft plastic, and unseasoned wood these instruments are made of increases the likeliness of bent keys, dented tubing and warped bridges resulting from daily assembling and student use! These instruments are a certain guarantee that the beginning music student will become discouraged and drop out of the music program. If enough students and their families suffer this experience, it is certain to adversely affect our school music programs.

Some parents purchase these instruments instead of renting, thinking they are saving money. However, in fact, this may cost them immeasurably. Between the purchase price and inevitable repair cost(s), they can spend between \$200-\$400 within the first weeks, and their child will have spent many frustrated hours trying to play an instrument that by its very design is unplayable. No one likes to experience repeated failure; so predictably, these students drop out of the music program, believing that music is not for them. The parents now have an instrument that is worthless and a child who feels like a failure. Rent a quality instrument and when in doubt, seek the guidance and assistance of your child's ensemble director.

Why should I rent an instrument and not purchase one at the beginning stage? It is important to give your child the chance to learn the instrument before making that big investment. Also, instruments rented are fully covered if the instrument needs a repair—this is great piece of mind!

Can we use an older instrument that I used to play as a child? Yes....IF the instrument is of good quality. We would recommend that before your child begins the program that you take it to a music

STEP 3 Instrument Fitting and Instrument Rental/Supplies

At your Instrument Fitting Appointment, students will have an opportunity to try their top two recommended instruments. A music educator will lead them through this process of first trying the mouthpiece then the entire instrument. Student success is the most important part of this process. Clearly, the student needs to like the instrument, but the music educator will make sure that it is the correct "fit" for them. Parents are an important part of this decision making process. When the final decision is made within this appointment, the music educator will discuss the goals and objectives for the upcoming school year. Ward Brodt Music will be at both final fitting nights so that you can order supplies and make arrangements for an instrument rental if needed. You will also be able to sign up that evening for the *Band Starts Now!* Class (free)

Instrument Rental/ Supplies - In order to take band each family needs to make arrangements to either rent or purchase an instrument and supplies. Students selecting the flute, clarinet, trumpet, and trombone will need to rent from the music store. The price ranges from \$23-\$33 per month for these instruments. Students selecting the euphonium or tuba will need to purchase a mouthpiece (one time fee of \$52-\$90) and rent an instrument from the school (\$50 per year). If you are renting a school instrument it will be added to your school fees in Infinite Campus. Students selected for percussion will be informed of their selection prior to the instrument fitting night. These students should still come to the fitting to review goals and objectives and to make arrangements to purchase sticks, mallets, books, and accessories from the music store. All students will need the designated lessons books and miscellaneous supplies. Again, the music store will take care of all your needs. You will not have to put money down the evening of the final fitting (April 27 & 29). We do not want finances to prevent your child from participating in band. If you have financial concerns, please contact your band director. All instrument rental agreements should be completed by the first week of June so that materials will be ready in time for the *Band Starts Now!* Summer Class. (all rentals/supplies can be ordered on-line!!)

STEP 4

Sign Up For The *Band Starts Now!* August 17-21, 2020

The first day your child will begin band will be in our *Band Starts Now!* Class. *Band Starts Now!* is a five day class that meets just before school starts at your child's future middle school. Students will meet in like-instrument classes for 90 minutes each day. The class is offered as a Sun Prairie School District Summer School Enrichment Course. There is no fee for this course. Your band teacher will register your child for this class. Students will learn how to produce the first five notes on their instrument. The students will also learn about instrument care and maintenance including a brief history about their instrument. The goal is to lay a solid foundation of fundamental knowledge and skills needed to begin study of their instrument

Scoop on Band

When does band meet? Band meets every other day, all year round. Band meets during a student's study hall period in 6th grade.

Can my student be involved with other activities besides band? YES! Our middle schools are very lucky to have many different clubs and programs that students can join. All of these groups work very hard to make sure that we can share our students' time. Band students are involved in sports, drama club, the school musical, student council and much, much more!

What opportunities are in the different levels of band at the Middle Schools? Your first year in band is about learning the basics of playing your instrument. However, both 6th and 7th grade band students can be involved in Jazz band, Pep Band, various small ensembles. Our groups perform locally, tour the elementary schools, and go to a local university for a clinic each spring.

Does being in band take up a lot of time? Like any new skill, learning an instrument takes patience and practice. Students will meet their potential through consistent and routine practice.

Can my child participate in Band, Choir, and Orchestra? Yes, it is possible to do up to two performance music classes.

Can a student participate in both sports and band? YES! We have many students that are involved in numerous sports and do band. In fact, many varsity athletes do band in the high school.

Is there a band uniform? Yes, 6th and 7th grade band students wear the same uniform at all of our performances. Your child will be fitted for the band shirt during fall registration or the first week of school. The fee for this shirt will be added to your registration costs (around \$18.50). Black pants, black socks and black shoes are also needed to complete the band uniform but are the responsibility of the family to acquire.

When do lessons start? *Band Starts Now Class* (August 17-21) or during the first three days of school.

When should I rent my instrument? To ensure availability, it is recommended that an instrument be reserved **as soon as possible**. Although you will not need the instrument until August, it is better to secure arrangements with Ward Brodt Music as soon as possible including reservation and discussion of payment options.

What instruments does the school rent? Students studying the larger instruments such as the euphonium, tuba and percussion will pay a rental fee for use of a school instrument. However, these students will still need to purchase the correct supplies such as mouthpieces, reeds, books, etc.

Do the schools have smaller instruments to rent? While the middle schools do own some smaller instruments such as trumpets, clarinets, and flutes, these instruments are reserved for those in financial need (If interested in more information, please contact us). When at all possible, we recommend renting from a music store to insure that your child will be using a quality instrument.

Can my child play piano or guitar in band? The instruments we teach are the wind and percussion instruments found in the concert band. We do however encourage students who know how to play piano and guitar to join us in our jazz program.

Interested In The Oboe, Bassoon, Bass Clarinet, Saxophone, or French Horn??

These instruments are VERY important to our band program, however we start beginners on the “core” instruments of the band (flute, clarinet, trumpet, trombone, euphonium, tuba, percussion). Through research and experience, we have found that having students start on one of the core instruments has allowed them to start more successfully.

We will invite interested students to begin the study of the oboe, bassoon, bass clarinet, and French horn in the winter of their 6th grade year. Students will be considered for one of these instruments based on their interest, progress, practice habits, correct “fit” for the instrument, and balance of the ensemble.

Near the end of the 6th grade year the number of saxophones needed for 7th grade band will be determined. Students will then be given the opportunity to try out for saxophone. Summer lessons are recommended for those who are selected.

We know that some students may not be chosen to play the saxophone in the 7th grade band. We recommend to those students that they continue on clarinet and play saxophone in jazz ensemble, pep band, and marching band.

Again, our ultimate goal is that your child is successful in band and music. We believe that starting students on these “core” instruments will help lay the foundation of musical excellence. It will also provide us with a vehicle to help balance the band instrumentation offering your child the very best musical education possible.

Tips For Success—Practicing At Home

Lessons offer students one of the most important ways to grow as a musician and to develop their own expressive "voice" through their playing. Being able to express ideas through an instrument requires technique and technique requires practice, patience, and perseverance. Through the study of exercises and musical literature contained within the lesson book(s), students will develop technique, and with it, the ability to communicate in a profound and expressive way.

Similar to other academics, your child's "homework" is to practice on a daily basis. Daily practice is essential to success. Remember, it is the efficiency and consistency of their practice routine that is as important as the amount of time spent.

Parents should help their child establish good practice and study habits from the beginning. Through a consistent approach, student progress and achievement will become increasingly apparent! Please encourage your child by asking them to perform for you at home. Your praise and approval of their accomplishment will, in many cases, provide instant gratification and that “pat on the back” students often need to experience in recognizing achievement and success.
